Update on Ban the Box

DESIRED OUTCOME:

Inform the City Council and Board of County Supervisors of the City of Flagstaff and Coconino County Ban the Box efforts.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The City's application for employment included the question, "Have you ever been convicted of or pled guilty to an offense as an adult, including DUI and reckless driving offenses (excluding minor traffic violations)?" In April of 2017 the Human Resources Division received direction from the Flagstaff City Council to begin efforts in removing this question from the City's employment application. There are similar efforts nationwide and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) has raised concerns about this type of application question. The Human Resources Division and City Attorney's Office worked together to remove this question from the City's application (both electronic and paper forms). The new application for employment was rolled out on September 29, 2017.

Coconino County adopted resolution 2017-29 on May 10, 2017, to Ban the Box and no longer require disclosure of past criminal history on the initial job application form.

INFORMATION:

The City's application for employment will no longer include a question about convictions. The City will continue to conduct a pre-employment background check that includes employment, criminal, motor vehicle and professional references verification. In addition, there may be other pre-employment requirements required for positions based on the essential job functions such as physical exams, physical agility exams, Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory (MMPI) exams, polygraph, immunizations or other health-related exams. There also may be supplemental materials required with an application such as the Police Department Background Questionnaire or a CDL Release in order to ensure the applicant may perform all essential job duties.



RESOLUTION NO. 2017-29

A RESOLUTION OF THE COCONINO COUNTY, ARIZONA, BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COMMITTING TO ADOPTING AND IMPLEMENTING HIRING PRACTICES THAT SUPPORT THE EMPLOYMENT OF REHABILITATED INDIVIDUALS WITH CRIMINAL RECORDS

WHEREAS, almost 70 million Americans – nearly one in three adults – have a criminal record; and

WHEREAS, criminal convictions often serve as a barrier to employment for rehabilitated individuals, which in turn contributes to recidivism, increased crime, and poverty in our community; and

WHEREAS, Coconino County is committed to economic development, public safety, and, as an employer, recognizes the need for recruiting qualified individuals for employment for various positions within the County; and

WHEREAS, Coconino County desires to assist otherwise qualified individuals with criminal histories by affording them an opportunity to compete equally for public employment and thereby assist them in successfully reintegrating into the community; and

WHEREAS, Coconino County supports the principle that individuals who have successfully completed their sentences deserve a second chance; and

WHEREAS, Coconino County is committed to the idea that rehabilitation should be our top priority and that making a poor decision should not necessarily define our future employment options;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors that the County will adopt and implement policies that support the employment of rehabilitated individuals with criminal records. Examples of such policies include, but are not limited to:

- 1. The County will "Ban the Box" and no longer require disclosure of past criminal history on the initial job application form;
- 2. The County will actively encourage rehabilitated individuals with criminal records to apply for employment by engaging community partners such as treatment providers, correctional facilities reentry specialists, and organizations assisting individuals in obtaining employment;
- 3. The County's Department of Human Resources is directed to determine which positions will continue to require background checks, due to their work with vulnerable populations or the safety-sensitive nature of the positions, and to develop recommendations for such policies and procedures as may be necessary to implement this policy.
- 4. The County will encourage contractors and entities who do business with Coconino County to follow suit and provide employment opportunities to individuals with criminal records.

Legislative Issues Including Joint Resolution of Support for Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (CPACE).

DESIRED OUTCOME:

Staff recommends that the City of Flagstaff and Coconino County create a joint resolution of support for CPACE.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (CPACE) is an economic development financing tool that is driven by local governments collaborating with commercial property owners and lenders to upgrade properties, create local jobs and revitalize neighborhood commercial centers. These upgrades consist of new windows, roofs, insulation, lighting, HVAC systems, water saving fixtures, and other clean energy improvements.

As an economic development tool, CPACE creates local jobs, increases property values and revitalizes neighborhoods. In addition, CPACE helps the City and County improve sustainability through the clean energy improvements.

In order for CPACE to be available to Coconino County and Flagstaff residents, the state of Arizona must pass a bill that authorizes contractual assessment-based financing. The County would then opt into the program that allows property owners to secure the private financing through the lien process. Rick Moore, Clean Energy and Efficiency Director, with the Grand Canyon Trust is working with the City and County on advancing state legislation that allows for CPACE. Mr. Moore will provide a presentation at the joint work session on November 6, 2017.

DESIRED OUTCOME:

To learn about multiple projects related to Dark Sky Preservation and the lighting code standards.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Flagstaff, Arizona has the world's longest-standing and most comprehensive measures in place to preserve the quality of the night sky. Initially established to preserve dark skies for astronomical research, the standards now serve diverse stakeholders. As of 2017, three distinct but interrelated dark-sky-preservation efforts are underway and proceeding toward completion on well-defined timescales, that will ensure the preservation of dark skies in northern Arizona for decades to come and that will serve as a national model for implementing effective outdoor lighting practices in the LED era.

INFORMATION:

A presentation on several projects will be provided by Jeff Hall, Director of Lowell Observatory. The projects are Street Lighting to Enhance Dark Skies (SLEDS), the Naval Observatory Flagstaff Station Mission Compatibility Light Pollution Study and the Joint Land Use Study (JLUS). In addition to project teams a local Dark Sky working group has been formed. Implementation of the Light Pollution Study recommendations will require amendments to the City and County lighting standards. Additional amendments may result from the JLUS. 

Flagstaff, AZ has the world's longest-standing and most comprehensive measures in place to preserve the quality of the night sky. Initially established to preserve dark skies for astronomical research, the standards now serve diverse stakeholders. As of 2017, three distinct but interrelated dark-sky-preservation efforts are underway and proceeding toward completion on well-defined timescales, that will ensure the preservation of dark skies in northern Arizona for decades to come and that will serve as a national model for implementing effective outdoor lighting practices in the LED era.

SLEDS: Street Lighting for Enhancing Dark Skies

A collaboration between the City of Flagstaff, Lowell Observatory, the U. S. Naval Observatory, and the Flagstaff Dark Skies Coalition.

The SLEDS team has identified optimum fixtures for the City's retrofit of its aging low-pressure and high-pressure sodium street light system to LED. The new fixtures will employ principally narrow band amber LEDs, with some low-temperature white LEDs along arterials and major collectors. Compared with typical LED outdoor lighting conversions around the world, this is an exception dark-sky-preserving solution that the SLEDS team hopes will serve as a model to other communities.

Test fixtures will be delivered in November 2017 and will be installed in the early part of 2018. Full retrofit of the City's 3,700 street lights will occur over the next few years.

MCS: Mission Compatibility Study of the U.S. Naval Observatory

A collaboration between the City of Flagstaff and the U. S. Naval Observatory.

USNO has conducted a study to understand the effects on its mission of buildout in Flagstaff under current zoning. This has resulted in a set of six recommendations to reduce the sky glow from further development to a point that USNO's mission is not compromised. These recommendations are presented in the letter attached to this Summary. The letter was developed by the Navy and Lowell Observatory, and has been endorsed by the regional Dark Sky Working Group (DWSG), a committee of diverse stakeholders.

JLUS: Joint Land Use Study

A collaboration between Coconino Country, the Navy, the AZ Army National Guard, and regional stakeholders

A JLUS is a standard military conduit for evaluation of mission and development compatibility between military bases and surrounding communities. The County has awarded a \$450K contract to Makers Architecture and Urban Design of Seattle to facilitate the process, scheduled for completion in Fall 2018. A JLUS establishes no policy or regulation, but rather makes recommendations to policymakers. Dark-sky preservation is one of the multiple priorities of the JLUS.


These three efforts represent a comprehensive and collaborative regional commitment to preserving the quality of northern Arizona's night skies. Such a thorough approach is worthy of wide recognition.



NO FLAGSTAFF : ARIZONA

Naval Observatory (NO) Flagstaff is the national dark-sky observatory site for the Department of Defense, located in an area of north-central Arizona with the ideal geographic, climatic, and atmospheric conditions for scientific observation and research of the night sky. This observation and research forms the basis of star catalogs and orientation of space systems. NO Flagstaff is also where the Precise Time and Time Intervals used across the DoD are maintained.

Many local government entities promote lighting codes to protect dark night skies in the region in support of the mission at NO Flagstaff, but there continue to be multiple encroachment threats. These threats include residential and commercial incompatible development, which can still increase light pollution, and smoke from



wood burning fireplaces that obstructs clear skies required for sensitive telescopes. The Navy is also seeking easements that require a prescribed fire regime on forest lands to reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfire while also benefiting a healthy native ecosystem.

In addition to protecting the observatory's mission, the NO

Flagstaff REPI partnership also supports the mission at Camp Navajo, located a few short miles down the road. Limiting incompatible development protects Camp Navajo's high altitude readiness training from additional lights and noise complaints and safeguards the installation from the risk of trespass into storage areas for munitions and Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty compliant materials. This REPI project also has significant community and environmental benefits, providing habitat for the threatened Mexican spotted owl and protecting water recharge supply for DoD and local communities.

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As leaders of the international dark sky movement since its inception in the 1950s, the dark sky community, the Flagstaff City Council, and the Coconino County Board of Supervisors have proactively sought ways to celebrate, promote, and protect the dark skies of Flagstaff and Northern Arizona.

Recently proposed rezoning for developments in the Flagstaff area have highlighted the need to examine and analyze the existing lighting codes, in concert with addressing future development impacts of exterior lighting on dark skies. Our intent is to ensure that any new development complies with lighting codes that will preserve multiple positive aspects of natural darkness, while supporting the Naval Observatory Flagstaff Station (NOFS) and its National Security mission.

To support this effort, the US Navy prepared a mission compatibility study to address lighting impacts on dark skies and the achievement of its mission. This study considered an inventory of existing land uses, projected impacts on the dark sky from new exterior lighting originating from new developments, and assembled recommendations for updates to lighting codes that would protect Northern Arizona's nightime environment.

The mission compatibility study recommends the following six key areas be considered for updates to the lighting codes to work in concert with new development without restricting future growth:

1. Expand use of canopies in lighting zone I.

2. Extend requirements of lighting zone II into lighting zone III.

3. Assemble a database of existing nonconforming lighting, and review nonconforming parcels annually.

4. Modernize measurement of absolute lumens to account for increasing use of LED lighting.

5. Update residential roadway lighting requirements.

Revise residential lighting codes to measure average lighting output over time rather than maximum output.

The undersigned of the Dark Sky Working Group seek the support of Flagstaff City Council and the Coconino County Board of Supervisors for these measures, and strongly recommend their incorporation into the city and county codes.



DESIRED OUTCOME:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On July 19, 2016 United States Senator John McCain announced the formation of the Northern Arizona Military Advocacy Council (NAMAC) during a Greater Flagstaff Chamber of Commerce event. As a result of federal regulations that restrict the marketing and promotion of military installations by military personnel for use by private industry NAMAC was created to act as an intermediary and promote economic development for Camp Navajo and other military installations in Northern Arizona.

Mayor Evans and County Supervisor Matt Ryan have met with staff members from Senator McCain's Office and Chamber President, Julie Pastrick, to better understand NAMAC's purpose and its effect on the City and County. Ms. Pastrick was appointed by Senator McCain to oversee the creation of NAMAC and will be at the November 6, 2017 meeting to discuss the organizations purpose and how the County and City can be a partner.

2017 Winter Recreation Taskforce Update

DESIRED OUTCOME:

The presentation is informational. Staff from various agencies in the region will give updates on this year's plans for winter recreation preparedness.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Winter Recreation Agency and Community Task Forces have been meeting regularly to plan for the upcoming winter recreation season and the challenges faced by the community during peak winter recreation times, namely holiday weekends. The multi-jurisdictional groups have representation from federal, state, and local government agencies, as well as community and business representatives. Efforts this year have focused on improving the winter recreation guide, clarifying issues such as no parking allowed along Highway 180 and County roads, noting that the Wing Mountain and Crowley Pit Snowplay areas are closed this season, and highlighting winter recreation opportunities outside of the Highway 180 corridor. Examples include the synthetic skating rink that will be at the Visitor's Center, local Flagstaff parks that are available for passive snowplay, and the Flagstaff Snowpark that will be operational at Fort Tuthill County Park again this season.

INFORMATION:

This year's presenters will include the Convention and Visitor's Bureau staff to discuss their messaging and the updated winter recreation guide, Public Works staff to discuss the plan for solid waste and recycling education and collection, the Flagstaff Police Department, and the Coconino County Emergency Manager to discuss this year's Incident Action Planning efforts. Other agencies will be present to answer questions.








City of Flagstaff Convention & Visitors Bureau and Agency Winter Recreation Task Force <u>Proposed Solution</u>

Flagstaff Convention & Visitor Bureau (CVB) will include "play responsibly" messaging in all print, digital and out of home messaging. CVB and Agency Winter Recreation Task Force will continually update external messaging as needed. In addition, a working group will be determining safe and appropriate locations and the servicing schedule for portable toilets along the Highway 180 corridor.

ISSUE 2: Ingress and egress are significant challenges for emergency responders during Highway 180 corridor peak winter recreation traffic congestion.

<u>Oversight</u>

Coconino County Community Winter Recreation Task Force, Flagstaff Fire Department, Summit Fire District and Guardian Medical Transport.

Proposed Solution

Development of FFD, Summit FD, and Guardian Incident Action Plan for peak congestion days.

ISSUE 3: Winter snow play visitors leave litter and broken sleds on public and private land.

<u>Oversight</u>

City of Flagstaff Public Works, City of Flagstaff CVB, City of Flagstaff Sustainability Program, Coconino County Public Works, Coconino County Public Health Services District, Coconino County Sustainability, U.S. Forest Service, Community Winter Recreation Task Force.

Proposed Solution

City of Flagstaff will lead effort to form a working group to develop strategies to address this problem. This group will determine safe and appropriate locations for trash and recycling receptacles and the servicing schedule.

- \$50,000 FY18 Contingency
